


Neighborhoods in Queens



LaGuardia students come from all over the world. Among the 18,533 students in academic programs, there are 158 countries represented and 89 different native languages. Nearly all LaGuardia students reside in New York City. Sixty-nine percent live in Queens, down slightly from Fall 2009, when seventy percent were Queens residents.






Age Fall 2015 to Fall 2019

There is a wide range of ages in the credit-student population. Half of students were traditional college age in 2019 (age 17 to 22) while eight percent were younger than 17. Nevertheless, about one third of the students were older than 25 with sixteen percent over 30. The median age remains at 21, unchanged since Fall 2013.

Similar to their peers nationally, the majority of credit students at LaGuardia are women. In Fall 2019 the proportion of women in the student body was fifty-eight percent, lower than the high point in Fall 2005 when it was sixty-two percent. Nationally, fifty-seven percent of the students enrolled in 2-year colleges were female in 2018 (the most recent data available).



Gender by Ethnic Background Fall 2019



One of the core values of LaGuardia Community College is diversity. The metric often used for diversity is the proportion of under-represented minorities (URM). URM are comprised of Hispanic, Black (Non-Hispanic) and Native American. While non-resident international students are not separated in the previous LaGuardia based charts, mandated federal reports to the National Center of Educational Statistics (NCES) exclude the race/ethnic information of non-resident students. Consequently, when NCES data are used for national comparisons, the race/ethnic information for LaGuardia is slightly different than reported in the previous charts. Accordingly, LaGuardia's URM in Fall 2018 was 61 percent of the student body while the URM for all 2-year public institutions in Fall 2018 according to NCES was 33 percent of the total student population.

Financial Resources

2019-2020

Sixty-six percent of annual degree students (11,775 out of 17,939) were awarded some form of grant scholarship financial aid in 2019-20, forty-eight percent of whom lived independently of their parents. Among full-time students, seventy-eight percent (9,614 out of 12,336) were awarded financial aid. Financial need is computed by subtracting a federally determined proportion of a student family's financial resources from the total cost of attendance. Six percent of students on aid took out Direct Loans. Almost Fifty-two percent of LaGuardia awarded dependent student families, and more than seventy-one percent of awarded independent students earned less than \$25,000.





Compere to Fall 2018, Fall 2019 total credit enrollment dropped by 703 students (-4% change), while the number of new credit students (freshmen, transfer, and non-degree) increased from by 215 new students (5% change).

Credit Students by Degree Type Fall 2015 to Fall 2019

Over the past five years the proportion of Associate of Science (A.S.) of the degree seeking students fluctuated from 45 percent to 49 percent, while the proportion of Associate of Arts (A.A) students decreased from 27 percent to 24 percent. The proportion of students enrolled in occupational degree programs for the Associate in Applied Sciences (A.A.S.) degree fluctuated from 24 percent to 28 percent in the past five years, and are at their highest point in Fall 2019 (28%).



Fall 2005 to Fall 2019



Part-time students took an average of 5.6 equated (college-level and non-college-level) credits in Fall 2019 campared to 6.3 in Fall 2018, while full-time students took an average of 15.8 equated credits, similar to the average equated credit load of full-time students in Fall 2018.


The percent of fall first-time full-time degree-seeking students earning 30 or more college level credits in their first year staedily increased from 9.2 percent in Fall 2013 to 18.8 percent in Fall 2017, an then dropped to 15.4 percent in Fall 2018. This is a university-wide key performance metric for the goal of reducing the time to degree.

Note: Here we use the Full Time Equivalent course load of 15 credits to calculate FTEs. This differs from the definition of a full-time student which is an attempted credit and/or equated credit load of 12 or more. The FTEs of the previous years have been revised based on CUNYfirst enrollment records.

Credit Students by Day and Evening Fall 2019





Evening courses are those that begin after 5:45 PM on weekdays. If a student had no weekday courses beginning after 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Day" course schedule group. Likewise, if a student had no courses that began before 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Evening" course schedule group. Students with mixed schedules, that is, some day courses, some evening courses, and perhaps even a weekend course, were put in the "Mixed" schedule category.




LaGuardia offers classes on a two-semester basis, fall and spring, each year with each semester divided into two sessions, I and II. The four annual sessions run consecutively and do not overlap. Each Session I lasts twelve weeks, while each Session II lasts six. Many students take a full semester load spread over Session I and Session II. The semester/session calendar allows students more flexibility in scheduling with four possible start dates. The possibility of spreading a semester's load over 18 weeks also allows students to schedule class and work time more efficiently. For Fall 2019, fifty-one percent of session I students also enrolled in Session II, down from a high of fifty-three percent in Fall 2018 but same as 2017.

Class Size Distribution by Session




The average class in Session I of Fall 2019 was 24.6 students, while the average class in Session II was 19.6 students. Session I class size is slightly higher than Fall 2018 (23.3 students) while Session II average class size was slightly lower than 2018 fall (21.5 students).

Degree-Seeking Students Fall 2015 to Fall 2019


Applicants who are admitted to LaGuardia pass through the City University admissions system. Applicants list their preferences for particular CUNY schools. CUNY allocates applicants to each college in multiple phases. Beginning in 2012 any student who indicated LaGuardia as one of six CUNY choices was counted as admitted. The number of admitted students in Fall 2019 decreased by five percentage points from Fall 2018. The percent of those who tested and enrolled at LaGuardia increased from twenty-three percent to twenty-five percent from Fall 2018 to Fall 2019.


by First-Time, Transfer, and Non-Degree Status Fall 2015 to Fall 2019

In Fall 2019, the proportion of new students enrolled in Associate in Sciences (A.S.) programs of the total degree seeking students was forty-two percent, the same as the Fall 2018 figure and a decline compared to forty-eight percent in Fall 2016 and 2017. The proportion of new students enrolled in Associate in Arts (A.A.) programs dropped by three percentage point from Fall 2015 and Fall 2016. 



The proportion of students with high school diplomas as a share of the total new credit students has increased in Fall 2019 to fifty-eight percent up by five percentage points from Fall 2018, but similar to the prior years. TASC proportions is similar to the previous years. The proportion of transfer students is comparable to fall 2017 and 2016, but a four percentage points lower compared to Fall 2018.



Basic Skills Needs

First-Time Degree-Seeking Students, Fall 2015 to Fall 2019



In Fall 2019 the proportion of students required to take basic skills math fell to an all-time low of thirty-six percent. This is less than half of what the math remedial rate was just five years ago in 2015. The large drop is most likely due to two factors: 1) The change in the math placement test to accuplacer and 2) students who score close to passing are allowed to re-take the math placement exam. The percent of students requiring remediation in writing and reading has dropped somewhat since 2015 but nowhere near the math level.


Students may meet the requirement for basic skills through testing or high scores on Regent's, ACT or SAT tests.

While the percent of entering students that either pass all remedial examinations or based on their high school scores are exempt has dropped by two percentage point between 2019 and 2018, it has almost trippeled compared to the 2015 rates of eighteen percent. The percent of entering students that pass none of the remedial exams has dropped by over fifty percent in four years. New Math exams and allowing students who score close to passing a retest are likely to be the cause for much of this change.



The proportion of A.S. degrees conferred reached their highest level in 2018-19 (8 percentage points increase from 2015-16) due in part to efforts to promote enrollment in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math majors (STEM). A corresponding decline for A.A.S. degrees (4% from 2015-16) is likely due to a movement from A.A.S. to A.S., while the proportions of A.A. declined by 2 percentage points compared to the pervious two years.





Degrees Awarded by Race and Ethnic Origin




The racial and ethnic composition of the graduating class at LaGuardia was similar to that of the student body as a whole last year.

Comparative Racial and Ethnic Distribution







GPAs of Graduates


Average GPA Ranges of Graduates 2014-15 through 2018-19

Baccalaureate Transfer Rate of Graduates



Five-Year Trend of One-Year Transfer Rates







Employed Full or Part Time




Educational Preparation for Employment and Starting Salary


Salary Distribution of All 2017-18 Graduates Within One Year from Graduation









ACE Enrollment by Borough Fall 2019









Full Time Tax Levy Employees by Job Category and Age Range, Fall 2019







Workforce Percentages by Years of Employment at LaGuardia, Fall 2019







Tenure Track Faculty by Tenure Status* Fall 2019














Circulation Transactions of General & Reserve Collections (in thousands)






Grant Awards by Source FY 2014-15 to FY 2018-19






