


Age Fall 2017 to Fall 2021

There is a wide range of ages in the credit-student population. Half of students were traditional college age in 2021 (age 17 to 22) while eight percent were younger than 17. Additionally, about one third of the students were older than 25 with eighteen percent over 30. The median age remains at 21, and is unchanged since Fall 2013.

Gender Fall 2017 to Fall 2021




Similar to their peers nationally, the majority of credit students at LaGuardia are women. In Fall 2021 the proportion of women in the student body was fifty-eight percent, lower than the high point in Fall 2005 when it was sixty-two percent. Nationally, sixty percent of the students enrolled in 2-year public colleges were female in 2020 (the most recent data available).



One of the core values of LaGuardia Community College is diversity. The metric often used for diversity is the proportion of under-represented minorities (URM). URM are comprised of Hispanic, Black (Non-Hispanic) and Native American. While non-resident international students are not separated in the previous LaGuardia based charts, mandated federal reports to the National Center of Educational Statistics (NCES) exclude the race/ethnic information of non-resident students. Consequently, when NCES data are used for national comparisons, the race/ethnic information for LaGuardia is slightly different than reported in the previous charts. Accordingly, LaGuardia's URM in Fall 2020 was 62 percent of the student body while the URM for all 2-year public institutions in Fall 2020 according to NCES was 40 percent of the total student population. Additionally, 6% of LaGuardia students are international compare to 1% nationally.

Financial Resources 2021-2022


Ninety-nine percent of annual degree students (13,685 out of 13,844) were awarded some form of grant, scholarship or financial aid in 2021-22. Forty-eight percent of students who filled FAFSA lived independently of their parents. Almost all full-time students (99.9%) (8,976 out of 9,002) were awarded financial aid. Financial need is ascertained by subtracting a federally determined proportion of a student family's financial resources from the total cost of attendance. Three percent of students receiving aid took out Direct Loans. Almost half of the financially dependent student families, and fifty-four percent of the financially independent students who were awarded aid earned less than \$25,000.



Compared to Fall 2020, Fall 2021 total credit enrollment dropped by 2,039 students from 16,952 to 14,913 (-12.0% change). Additionally, the number of new credit students (freshmen, transfer, and non-degree) decreased by 527 new students (-12.8% change).

Credit Students by Degree Type Fall 2017 to Fall 2021

Over the past five years the proportion of Associate of Science (A.S.) of the degree seeking students decreased from a 49 percent high in Fall 2017 to 43 percent in Fall 2021. The proportion of Associate of Arts (A.A) students decreased from 26 percent to 22 percent. The proportion of students enrolled in occupational degree programs for the Associate in Applied Sciences (A.A.S.) degree has been increasing from 24 percent to 32 percent in the past five years.



Credit Students by Full-Time and Part-Time Status Fall 2012 to Fall 2021




In Fall 2021 fifty percent of the student body was full-time, lower than in previous years. In the past decade the proportion of full-time students has decreased, with a four percentage points drop compared to Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.

Part-time students took an average of 7.0 equated credits (college-level and remedial credits) in Fall 2021 compared to 7.1 in Fall 2020, while full-time students took an average of 15.5 equated credits, compared to the average 15.7 equated credit load of full-time students in Fall 2020.


The percent of fall first-time full-time degree-seeking students earning 30 or more college level credits in their first year steadily increased from 9.2 percent in Fall 2013 to 18.8 percent in Fall 2017. After falling to 15.7 percent in Fall 2018, the proportion of full-time freshmen who earned 30 credits or more, rebounded to 17.3 percent in Fall 2019 and 16.6 percent in Fall 2020.

Note: We use the Full Time Equivalent course load of 15 credits to calculate FTEs. This differs from the definition of a full-time student which is an attempted credit and/or equated credit load of 12 or more. The FTEs of the previous years have been revised based on CUNY first enrollment records.

Attendance Pattern for Session 1 Only



Evening courses are those that begin after 5:45 PM on weekdays. If a student had no weekday courses beginning after 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Day" course schedule group. Likewise, if a student had no courses that began before 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Evening" course schedule group. Students with mixed schedules, that is, some day courses, some evening courses, and perhaps even a weekend course, were put in the "Mixed" schedule category.

Fall Enrollment by Session Fall 2017 to Fall 2021





LaGuardia offers classes on a two-semester basis, fall and spring, each year with each semester divided into two sessions, I and II. The four annual sessions run consecutively and do not overlap. Each Session I lasts twelve weeks, while each Session II lasts six weeks. Many students take a full semester load spread over Session I and Session II. The semester/session calendar allows students more flexibility in scheduling with four possible start dates. The possibility of spreading a semester's load over 18 weeks also allows students to schedule class and work time more efficiently. For Fall 2021, forty eight percent of session I students also enrolled in Session II, down from a high of fifty-three percent in Fall 2018.

Class Size by Session Fall 2017 to Fall 2021






The average class in Session I of Fall 2021 was 21.1 students, while the average class in Session II was 19.7 students. Session I class size is lower than Fall 2020 (23.2 students) while Session II average class size was slightly lower than 2020 fall (19.9 students).

New Students Admission and Enrollment

Degree-Seeking Students Fall 2017 to Fall 2021

Applicants who are admitted to LaGuardia pass through the City University admissions system. Applicants list their preferences for particular CUNY schools. CUNY allocates applicants to each college in multiple phases. Beginning in 2012 any student who indicated LaGuardia as one of six CUNY choices was counted as admitted. The proportion of admitted freshmen who enrolled at LaGuardia remained steady at about 14 percent. The proportion of admitted transfers who enrolled decreased from its 50 percent high in Fall 2018 to 37 percent in Fall 2021.




by First-Time, Transfer, and Non-Degree Status Fall 2017 to Fall 2021



The Fall 2021 number of first-time freshmen declined by 24 percent from its 2019 high, while the number of transfers declined by 35 percent compared to Fall 2019. 



Approximately seventy-two percent of the first-time students have high school grades recorded at entry. The 2021 distribution is different from previous years with an increase of eight percentage points compared to the last three years for students in the 70 to 80 GPA range and a decrease of eight percentage points in students with "above-average" GPA (range of 80 and above) compared to Fall 2020 (the decrease is only 4 percentage points for Fall 2017 to Fall 2019). However, in Fall 2021 the "below-average" GPA (less than 70) grades, is the lowest in the past five years.











Degrees Awarded by Race and Ethnic Origin



Comparative Racial and Ethnic Distribution




Degrees Awarded by Entering Basic Skills Status Five-Year Trend






GPAs of Graduates



About a quarter of graduates in 2016-17 to 2019-20 earned an average GPA of 3.5 or higher while about a third earned a GPA of 3-3.45 and about 40 percent earned average GPA of less than 3. However, the average GPA for the 2020-21 graduates improved considerably with about 10 percent more earning grades over 3.5 and 10 percent fewer earning a GPA that is less than 3.0. This is probably because of the CR/NC grading policy during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Baccalaureate Transfer Rate of Freshmen



Five-Year Trend of One-Year Transfer Rates






Post-Graduation Primary Activity

Employed Full or Part Time






Salary Distribution of All 2020-21 Graduates Within Six Month from Graduation



The 98% pass rate in 2021 for the National Licensure Examination (NCLEX) for LaGuardia students is the second highest among all CUNY schools. This is a considerable increase compared to the 2016 rates (91%). The 2021 LaGuardia rate is about twenty percent higher compared to both New York State and National Associate programs. It is nine percent higher compared to CUNY community colleges average, and nineteen percent higher compared to CUNY comprehensive colleges average.








ACE Enrollment by Borough Fall 2021









Full Time Tax Levy Employees by Job Category and Age Range, Fall 2021






Full Time Tax Levy Employees







Tenure Track Faculty by Tenure Status* Fall 2021








Circulation Transactions of General & Reserve Collections (in thousands)










